

Pediatric Multi-System Inflammatory Syndrome Impacting Childrens' Health

NYS: GOVERNOR CUOMO



 Governor Cuomo announced that a new investigation is under way regarding potential COVID-19 related cases in children. Cases reported have increased to a total of 73 in New York, up from 15. Symptoms can be compared to Kawasaki disease and toxic shock-like syndrome. The Department of Health issued an advisory of what's called the "Pediatric Multi-System Inflammatory Syndrome," and now requires healthcare providers to immediately report all related cases. The Department of Health and Mental Hygiene released a <u>health advisory</u> detailing current findings.

- Unemployment claims have increased from 2.8% last month to 20% this month, exceeding the rate of unemployment since the Great Depression. While challenges exist in the speed of processing claims, \$6.8 billion has been paid to 1.6 million people in the last 7 weeks. In comparison, the year of 2019, a total of \$2.1 billion in claims were paid. For information click, here.
- Governor Cuomo will consider payment to COVID-19 related unemployed individuals who did not qualify for benefits due to length of work, if the federal government funds the state to do so. Currently, the federal government has a program to address individuals falling in that category, Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA).
- Governor Cuomo announced that he will immediately address the disproportionate number of COVID-19 cases in Black and Latino communities. **20 of the 21 zip codes** with the highest hospitalization cases are populated by a majority of Blacks and Latinos.

NYC: MAYOR DE BLASIO

- Mayor de Blasio announced the launch of **Test and Trace Corps** to suppress the spread of COVID-19. A dedicated group of professionals who have a wealth of knowledge and experience in healthcare will make up this group whose goal is to be swift in executing contact tracing.
 - Staffing of 1,000 by May, and 2,500 by June
 - Testing **20,000 test per day by May 25**; and 50,000 test per day
 - **300**+ public and private community sites
 - Hiring has begun with over **7,000** applications submitted.
- Isolation for individuals requiring quarantine will be offered **housing with support** such as social services, wrap around services and clinical services (food, medical care, laundry, etc).

• **1,200 hotels** to start will be made available in June.



• It was reported this week that two members in the White House have tested positive with COVID-19:

- Thursday, President Trump's personal valet
- Friday, Vice President Pence's Press Secretary
- In light of recent findings, new procedures have been put in place within the White House which include:
 - President Trump will increase testing for himself from once per week to once per day;
 - Staff in the White House residence are now required to wear masks; and
 - Increase sanitation in the West Wing

The **Child Victims Act** was signed into law by Governor Cuomo in 2019, providing a path for victims of child sex abuse to seek justice. For cases where a statute of limitations had been met, victims were given a one-year window to go back and file a claim. This window was set to expire on August 14, 2020

Due to a current shut down of the court systems because of COVID-19, the **expiration date has been extended to January 14, 2021.**

Assemblymember Rodneyse Bichotte, a victim of child sex abuse was a supporter of this legislation and welcomes the extension of time under the circumstances.

- **Amtrak**: Effective Monday, May 11th Amtrak will require passengers to wear face coverings when in the station and on trains and buses. They are booking 50% of cars' capacity to allow passengers to maintain social distancing. For more information, click <u>here</u>.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE SICK WITH COVID-19

What to do if you are sick with COVIDI coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19)

If you are sick with COVID-19 or suspect you are infected with the virus that causes COVID-19, follow the steps below to help prevent the disease from spreading to people in your home and community.

Stay home except to get medical care

You should restrict activities outside your home, except for getting medical care. Do not go to work, school, or public areas. Do not use public transportation, ride-sharing, or taxis.

Separate yourself from other people in your home

As much as possible, you should stay in a specific room and away from other people in your home. Also, you should use a separate bathroom, if available.

Call ahead before visiting your doctor

If you have a medical appointment, call the healthcare provider and tell them that you have or may have COVID-19. This will help the healthcare provider's office take steps to keep other people from getting infected or exposed.

Wear a facemask

CORONAVIRUS DISEASE

> You should wear a facemask when you are around other people (e.g., sharing a room or vehicle) and before you enter a healthcare provider's office. If you are not able to wear a facemask (for example, because it causes trouble breathing), then people who live with you should not stay in the same room with you, or they should wear a facemask if they enter your room.

Cover your coughs and sneezes

Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw used tissues in a lined trash can and wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, immediately clean your hands with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol, covering all surfaces of your hands and rubbing them together until they feel dry. Soap and water should be used preferentially if hands are visibly dirty.

Clean your hands

Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, clean your hands with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol, covering all surfaces of your hands and rubbing them together until they feel dry. Soap and water should be used preferentially if hands are visibly dirty. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

Avoid sharing personal household items

You should not share dishes, drinking glasses, cups, eating utensils, towels, or bedding with other people in your home. After using these items, you should wash them thoroughly with soap and water.

Monitor your symptoms

Seek prompt medical attention if your illness is worsening (e.g., shortness of breath or difficulty breathing). Before seeking care, call your healthcare provider and tell them that you have, or are being evaluated for, COVID-19. Put on a facemask before you enter the facility. These steps will help the healthcare provider's office keep other people from getting infected or exposed.

Ask your healthcare provider to call the local or state health department. Persons who are placed under active monitoring or facilitated self-monitoring should follow instructions provided by their local health department or occupational health professionals, as appropriate. https://www.cdc.pov/ coronavirus/2019-ncov/php/risk-assessment.html


Discontinuing home isolation

Patients confirmed to have COVID-19 should remain under home isolation precautions until the risk of secondary transmission to others is thought to be low. The decision to discontinue home isolation precautions should be made on a case-by-case basis, in consultation with healthcare providers and state and local health departments. Current information on COVID-19 is limited; home precautions are conservative and based on general recommendations for other diseases, like Middle Eastern Respiratory Syndrome (MERS).
