## Making health care more affordable

No one should ever have to put their health at risk because they can't afford the medical treatment they need. That's why Assemblywoman Jean-Pierre introduced and helped pass legislation in the 2020-21 state budget to cap the cost of insulin to \$100 for a 30-day supply. She also sponsored and helped pass Shannon's Law, which expands access to lifesaving breast cancer screenings by requiring insurance companies to cover the cost of mammograms (Ch. 143 of 2019). To provide workers with the relief and support they need, Assemblywoman Jean-Pierre helped pass a law expanding sick leave and other benefits to New Yorkers impacted by COVID-19 (Ch. 25 of 2020).

## Improving our schools

Every student deserves a quality education that provides them with the knowledge and tools they need to succeed in their future endeavors. Assemblywoman Jean-Pierre has always fought to support the Wyandanch Union Free School District and helped secure the appointment of a fiscal monitor to provide oversight and help get the district back on track (Ch. 754 of 2019). Along with strengthening our schools, Assemblywoman Jean-Pierre is committed to keeping our children out of harm's way. She helped pass the 2020-21 state budget which includes measures to ban public advertisements of tobacco and vaping products near school grounds as well as require manufacturers to disclose information about ingredients on all tobacco packaging. She also passed legislation ensuring schools that closed due to COVID-19 aren't penalized financially (ch. 107 of 2020).

## Expanding access to child care services

As a parent, Assemblywoman Jean-Pierre knows how important it is for families to have affordable and safe child care options. To help make this a reality for more working families, she fought to include \$832 million for child care subsidies in the 2019-20 state budget. Additionally, the 2019-20 state budget included a measure to create the New York State Employer-Provided Child Care Credit, which is equal to 100% of the federal credit, for employers who provide child and dependent care facilities to their employees.
