Protecting the Integrity of New York State's Election Systems

In September 2017, the United States Department of Homeland Security (DHS) confirmed to election officials in 21 states that their election systems had been targeted by Russian hackers during the 2016 election cycle. Such attacks included attempts to infiltrate state voter registration databases and, in two instances, hackers were successful in obtaining access to information in state voter registration systems. This confirmation by DHS comes on the heels of United States House, Senate and intelligence community investigations which offered further substantiation of Russian attempts to influence the 2016 election. Furthermore, these investigations confirmed that there is no reason to believe that such disruption attempts were isolated incidents, and that states need to upgrade their cyber security efforts to prevent, recognize and mitigate threats to state and local election systems.

On Tuesday, the Assembly Committee on Election Law held a hearing to examine the condition of the State's election infrastructure and take testimony with regard to protecting the integrity of election systems against cyber-infiltration or attack.



As a member of the Election Law committee, I attended the hearing and questioned New York State and City Board of Elections officials about the cyber security protections that we have in place to protect the integrity of our election systems as we approach the 2018 election cycle and beyond. MTA Metro Card Van


On Wednesday, my District Office hosted the MTA Metro Card van so that constituents could speak directly to an MTA representative and handle all their Metro Card business. Dozens of constituents were able to apply or refill their Reduced-Fare Metro Card, buy pay-per-ride cards, check the balance on expired cards and consolidate multiple cards that have a balance to one card.



It's rare for people to be so happy about something dealing with the MTA, but this service seemed to be hit, and I hope to be able to do it again in the future.

Free Flu Shot Day

Partnering with SUNY Downstate Medical Center, we offered free flu vaccines at my District Office. Almost 30 constituents from all over the 44th District came in to get vaccinated.

This is an important service, because many don't know that even if you rarely get the flu, you can still carry it and give it to someone else who can get sick. A big thanks to all the helpful staff from SUNY Downstate Medical Center who came by to help administer the vaccines for us.

Subway Delay Action Kit

I'm still working on ways that we can fix the MTA and get basic repairs and services implemented so that we achieve a reliable system that we can be proud of. Last week, I joined with transit advocates, the Riders Alliance, to announce their new initiative called the Subway Action Delay Kit. This kit gives everyday straphangers the tools to tell the Governor how an underfunded and mismanaged MTA is impacting their lives.
