**Alternate Side Parking rules:** Alternate Side Parking (ASP) rules allow for street cleaning. Most ASP signs are marked with the “P” symbol with the broom through it and indicate the days and times parking isn’t allowed. Some metered parking zones have ASP rules. Each year, the city suspends ASP rules on certain legal and religious holidays. This brochure lists the holidays with suspended ASP for 2024.



The city may also suspend ASP rules because of snow, inclement weather or other emergencies. Visit [nyc.gov/dot](http://nyc.gov/dot) or dial **311** for further information. TTY deaf or hearing-impaired, dial **212-504-4115**.

When ASP is suspended for a holiday or other reason, the parking meters remain in effect, and you must still follow any other posted parking time limits and rules.

*Reminder: ASP and parking meters are not in effect on Sundays.*

**\*Major Legal Holiday rules:** on major legal holidays, in addition to ASP being suspended, you can park at a No Stopping, No Standing, or No Parking sign *unless* the rule is normally in effect seven days a week (for example: "No Standing Anytime"). Parking meter regulations are also suspended on major legal holidays. On all other holidays, only street cleaning rules are suspended.

**Parking tickets:** parking tickets may be paid online via CityPay at [www.nyc.gov/citypay](http://www.nyc.gov/citypay), using the **NYC P-Ticket Pay or Dispute** app on your mobile device, by mail (make checks payable to "NYC Department of Finance") or in person at a DOF Business Center.

**Get connected:** find out the current alternate side parking status by visiting the NYC311 Online homepage [portal.311.nyc.gov](http://portal.311.nyc.gov), following [@NYCASP](https://twitter.com/NYCASP) on Twitter or using the **NYC311** app on your mobile device. You can also call **311** to find out if ASP is in effect or suspended.
