Seawright Received Ellen Hermanson Foundation Honor for Leading on Breast Cancer Screening Legislation

Over 15,000 women receive breast cancer diagnoses in New York each year and those whose cancer is detected at an early stage have a 93% or higher survival in the first five years of a diagnosis.

Assembly Member Seawright authored and passed legislation signed into law expanding access to 3D screenings without co-pays or deductibles. Now this legislation serves as a model, being replicated around the country.

As she continues her work to expand access to early detection breast cancer screenings, another bill she sponsors will extend insurance coverage for screenings for those with "second-degree" family health history of breast cancer, including for example, ones grandmothers and aunts.



Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright, who visited Miller in the hospital, has also been a major voice behind the growing e-bike problem—her name was listed today as a co-sponsor of the legislation. Seawright represents Miller's Upper East Side neighborhood, and she said her own daughter had been hit by a bicycle outside her local high school.

"Careless e-vehicle usage pose[s] deadly threats to our communities," she said. "No one should fear navigating their own neighborhoods.

Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright honored Chloe King York, a second grader at PS 183 in Manhattan's Upper East Side, who has made a significant impact at her school. At PS 183, the Green Team environmental group was traditionally open only to fourth and fifth graders. However, 8-year-old Chloe believed that second and third graders are just as capable of caring for the environment. True to her convictions, she decided to act. She created a petition advocating for the inclusion of younger students in the Green Team. Her efforts paid off and she collected enough signatures and now second and third graders at PS 183 are allowed to join the Green Team, thanks to her initiative.

Lead Sponsor of Equal Rights Amendment Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright Urges Public to Submit Comment on Proposal 1 for November 2024 Ballot

All New York voters deserve to understand what they are voting on to make an informed decision. In the legislature, critical voting rights legislation passed on the State level known as the plain language law requiring ballot measures to be written in plain language, at or below an eighth-grade reading level.

The New York State Board of Elections released proposed language for Proposal 1 that is above the reading level of the plain language law at a college reading level.

The ballot language as proposed is the following:

Adds Certain Protections to the State Bill of Rights

Adds anti-discrimination provisions to the State Constitution. Covers ethnicity, national origin, age, disability, and sex, including sexual orientation, gender identity and pregnancy. Also covers reproductive healthcare and autonomy.

A "YES" vote puts these protections against discrimination in the New York State Constitution.

A "NO" vote leaves these protections out of the State Constitution.


To ensure all voters can understand their ballots, you are asked to provide feedback on the proposed language.

The deadline to submit comment is Friday, July 26. The State Board of Elections will review and consider all public comments before adoption of the final ballot proposal 1. 
