- **Offers free SUNY tuition to volunteer firefighters** who meet certain eligibility requirements (A.2735)
- **Provides tax credits** to volunteer first responders (A.3479, A.4573, A.2087)
- **Allows community and SUNY colleges** to offer academic credit for volunteer fire service (A.4523)

Smoke alarms save lives – but only if they work

Smoke alarms can make all the difference in a fire – make yours work for you.

Each year, the American Red Cross launches its Home Fire Campaign to help reduce fire-related deaths and injuries in the United States. You can schedule a free appointment with trained volunteers who will install up to three free smoke alarms, help you and your family create a fire escape plan and provide valuable safety tips and training. 1 INSTALL

Place working smoke alarms in your home.



3 CLEAN

Clean your smoke alarm every year to get rid of any dust.



2 TEST

Make sure to test your smoke alarm at least monthly.



4 REPLACE

Each year, replace your alarm's battery at least once. Even better, change the battery when you reset your clocks in the spring and fall. **Or better yet, replace your removable battery detector with a new non-removable battery smoke detector that's good for 10 years!**
