

Assembly Speaker Tours District - Dedicates More Capital Funding



As part of his annual statewide tour, Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie joined me at **Joseph F. William Memorial Park** on June 18th, to visit the park's new **Splash Pad**.

In a previous Speaker's tour we announced \$250,000 in funding to support the splash pad's construction. It was nearly complete and

operating at the close of summer 2023. The work was finished this year which was celebrated with a ribbon cutting ceremony on June 14th. It's been a resounding success with children and families enjoying it throughout this extremely hot summer.







Plank Road Park on Mud Mill Road received funding for permanent **Pickle Ball Courts and a Tennis Court**.

The courts were officially opened on July 23rd with the help of a \$300,000 Assembly sponsored grant. Pickleball is one of the fastest growing sports in the country and the Town of Cicero found great

demand for courts. The sport is especially popular with seniors, but has caught on with people of all ages.

Courts 1 and 2 are open for walk-on play. Courts 3 and 4 can be reserved by going to CNYPickleball.com.





Speaker Heastie took this opportunity to announce \$3 million in capital funding for the construction of a **Swimming Pool** at **Cicero-North Syracuse High School.** This is in addition to \$2 million that the Assembly had approved in a previous budget, for a total \$5 million that we are contributing to this project.

The North Syracuse School District has been trying to build a pool since 1968. Fifty-six years later, construction has finally begun and we hope to see it open in early 2026. The pool will have a separate entrance for the public so that they can enjoy swimming in off-school hours.



The annual **Syracuse International Jazz Fest** in June was a huge success with headliners Kenny G, The O'Jays, Gunhild Carling, The Mavericks & Gino Vannelli bringing in crowds totaling 50,000. Regional jazz artists launched the five-day event attracting thousands of fans to downtown clubs and restaurants. As the grand finale, Hendricks Chapel at Syracuse University hosted "Return to Community: A Sunday Gospel Jazz Service". The Assembly provided a \$150,000 grant along with a Market NY grant of \$250,000 to support this remarkable free community event.

LEGISLATIVE HIGHLIGHTS

Building a Better Future for Central New York

Now that the legislative session has wrapped up, it's a great opportunity to reflect on the work we've done to improve the lives of Central New Yorkers and communities across the state. I'm proud to share some key legislative achievements from this session, each aimed at enhancing our environment, supporting local businesses, and improving the well-being of our residents.

A.4563 – To better preserve our natural resources, I passed a bill expanding the **Adopt-a-Municipal Park** program to include lakes. This allows volunteers and community groups to take a more active role in maintaining and caring for our lakes, ensuring these vital resources are preserved for future generations.

A.8036 – Recognizing the ongoing flood risks in the **Oswego River Basin**, I introduced and passed legislation to establish a stakeholder group dedicated to improving water management and flood mitigation in the area. This initiative will bring together local voices to develop strategies that protect our communities from the devastating effects of flooding.

A.9069 – Access to healthy food is essential for our communities. That's why I passed the **FRESH Communities Act**, which provides financial assistance to supermarkets and food retailers in underserved areas. This law increases access to fresh, nutritious food while supporting local agriculture and reducing environmental impacts.

The following bills were signed into law by the Governor:

A.8508 – On the economic front, I took steps to strengthen retirement security by removing barriers for self-employed individuals and employees of non-participating employers to join the **New York State Secure Choice Savings**

Program. By making it easier for more New Yorkers to save for retirement, we're helping to ensure a more secure future for everyone.

A.9584 – Lastly, I assisted a small business by passing a bill allowing the **Grotto**, a local restaurant venue, to obtain a full liquor license. This measure enables the Grotto to better serve its patrons by offering a full range of beverages at events and celebrations.

Each of these legislative efforts reflects our commitment to making Central New York a better place to live, work, and raise a family.

As always, there's more to be done, and I'm looking forward to continuing our work together in the next session.

Honoring Fayetteville's Finest


