Bill to Study Energy Grid Interconnection Passes Assembly

On February 5th, a bill that I sponsored to direct the Public Service Commission to conduct a study on the deployment of energy interconnection processes passed the Assembly (A4127).

The study would evaluate methods to maximize efficiency so that new renewable energy facilities can be more quickly interconnected onto the electrical grid. Currently, there is an interconnection queue, and a study must be completed for each proposed project to ensure that the overall grid system has the capacity needed before a project is allowed to connect to the grid.

When a project in the queue decides not to move forward, all projects behind it must redo their study because the total amount of power entering the grid has changed. This process can cause delays of several years!

Examples of possible methods are: "Connect and Manage"

used by the Electronic Reliability Council of Texas (ERGOT) which has allowed the state to keep up with electricity demands and rise to the top in large-scale solar power nationwide, as it actively manages the grid's capacity during the interconnection process. Another called "Clean Repowering", is an elegant and efficient solution that builds new clean energy resources where grid connections already exist to circumvent the lengthy interconnection queues.

Building new renewable energy and storage where fossil generation is retiring or alongside existing fossil plants could speed up the deployment of energy resources while reducing costs because we don't have to build as much new infrastructure.

The proposed study would analyze these methods along other with interconnection systems, processes, and technologies to ensure maximum productivity in bringing new electric production onto the grid.

Retail-to-Retail Alcohol Sales

Last December, Gov. Hochul signed legislation that I authored to allow **on-premise retail licensees (bars and restaurants) to buy a limited number of bottles of alcohol from off-premise retail licensees (liquor stores)**. A reality for many of our small taverns and restaurants is a simple lack of space to hold a lot of inventory, increasing their chances of running out of a particular bottle. Previously, they would be faced with losing business or facing fines if they bought liquor out of their routine shipment schedules, currently every two weeks.

Retail-to-Retail addresses this issue by permitting **local bars and restaurants to purchase up to six bottles of wine or liquor per week from a liquor store or retail licensee**. This law supports our smallest businesses and boosts the local economy for taverns, restaurants, and liquor stores alike. ***This act took effect on March 5, 2026.***

Jennifer Kirchoff for **Education**.

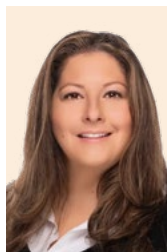
